Sustainability on the rise as FOGO reaches Altone

It's time for Beechboro, Bennett Springs, Kiara and parts of Lockridges to get their new bins as we roll out our three-bin kerbside collection system.

If you live in these suburbs, you will receive a letter in the lead up to your stage of the rollout explaining what to expect during your property's transition period and when it will happen.

The process involves leaving your general waste bin on your kerb until our team visits and swaps the dark green lid for a lime green FOGO lid.

We will also deliver a new redlid general waste bin, a kitchen caddy and the City's Waste and Resource Recovery Guide, which details how to use your new system.

FOGO stands for Food Organics and Garden Organics.

Your FOGO bin will collect organic food and garden materials which can be recovered and processed into FOGO products, such as compost or soil conditioner.

Introducing FOGO aligns the City with the State Government's Waste Strategy targets, and most importantly, helps us protect our natural environment for future generations.

We understand you might have questions about the new system.

Our FOGO educators will be out and about in the community at libraries and shopping centres to speak to you.

A responsible budget for a brighter future in Swan

Our Annual Budget 2024/25 has laid the foundation for an exciting year of growth for Swan.

Council adopted the budget at a Special Council Meeting on June 26, 2024, when they also passed a rate increase of 3.5 per cent.

The modest increase – lower than Australia's annual rate of inflation – marked only the second rate rise for the City in five years.

"We froze rates for three consecutive years after the onset of COVID-19 to lessen the financial burden of the pandemic on homes and businesses," Tanya Richardson, City of Swan Mayor, said.

"Council has been working hard to get this budget right in recent months and we're confident we've struck the right balance for our growing community."

The rate rise aligns the budget with the priorities in our Strategic Community Plan 2021-2031 (SCP) and Council's direction not to close facilities or cut services.

The SCP is the City's key strategic document, capturing the community's priorities for the next 10 years and breaking them down into five key result areas – Natural Environment, Economic, Social, Built Environment and Governance.

Our annual budget is the economic tool that allocates resources to put our SCP onto action.

"As Council Members, we set the City's strategic



direction, and that's a role we take very seriously," Mayor Richardson said.

"We spend a lot of time reviewing and refining these plans because it's critical to have an effective planning process, especially for a local government like ours which is growing rapidly."

The 2024/25 budget includes one of the biggest capital works programs in WA, featuring major infrastructure projects such as Swan Active Ellenbrook, the extension of Henley Brook Avenue and the construction of Ballajura Intergenerational Playspace.

Highlights from our \$155.5m capital works program:

- \$33.6m to improve our road network through road construction, upgrades, safety and parking projects
- \$7.7m to get kids playing outdoors with playspace construction and improvements
- \$5.5m to give local community groups a place to call home by building the Ellenbrook Community Hub

- \$3m to preserve our heritage with works on buildings such as the Midland Junction Arts Centre
- \$2.8m to boost sustainability by introducing a new three-bin FOGO system
- \$2.4m to improve access and safety on cycleways, footpaths and shared paths
- \$2m to continue the revitalisation of Midland with stage one construction of Trackside Entrance and Grandstand Way in the New Junction precinct
- \$1.6m to make Swan greener, including planting more than 1,200 street trees in line with the City's Urban Forest Plan
- \$900,000 to increase female participation in sport with changeroom upgrades in Beechboro and Ballajura
- \$100,000 to boost safety with the introduction of more mobile CCTV towers
- \$30,000 to increase accessibility by installing universal access ramps and pedestrian crossings in Ballajura

'It looks incredible' – Deputy Premier hails Dayton hub

Deputy Premier Rita Saffioti has hailed Dayton District Open Space as a "beautiful" addition to one of Perth's fastest growing areas.

Speaking at an official opening event at our \$30 million sport and recreation hub in June, Ms Saffioti said it was the latest step in the "complete transformation" of the Swan Urban Growth Corridor.

The 1,100ha Swan Urban Growth Corridor has experienced rapid population growth in recent years in relatively new suburbs such as Dayton, Brabham and Bennett Springs.

The population is expected to rise by another 50 per cent in the next 30 years.

Dayton District Open Space (DDOS) is a facility that can handle the growth, featuring sports ovals, hockey fields, netball and tennis courts, pavilions, a half-court basketball court and more.

It is the new home of the Ellenbrook Falcons and Eastern Blades hockey clubs, the Caversham Suns Junior Football Club and the Caversham Dayton Cricket Club.

Dayton is in Ms Saffioti's West Swan electorate, which she has represented in State Parliament since 2008.

In addition to being WA's Deputy Premier, Treasurer and Tourism Minister, the West Swan MLA also serves as the State's Transport Minister, overseeing the rollout of METRONET.

The Morley-Ellenbrook METRONET line will run through the City of Swan, with two stations planned for the Swan Urban Growth Corridor.

Ms Saffioti said delivering quality services and infrastructure for a growing community was a partnership between the State and local governments.

Major projects such as new schools, METRONET and DDOS were transforming the area.

"When I first got elected in 2008 there was a plan for this whole growth corridor, and it involved a number of things which are now being delivered," Ms Saffioti said.

"This space for local sports is so important and fundamental for the community."

She congratulated Swan on delivering a facility that would serve the area well for years to come.

"This is very beautiful, it looks incredible, and I think the local community and the local clubs will very much appreciate having this new infrastructure, quality fields, and delivering to sports that sometimes don't get the services or the facilities that other sports get," Ms Saffioti said.

"I think having the range of sports that you're supporting is a very, very good thing."

Get bushfire ready

Swan will enter the restricted burning period in October.

This means you cannot burn without a permit unless you meet strict requirements in certain cases.

Leading into summer, all property owners have a legal responsibility to conduct fire hazard reduction works such as maintaining an asset protection zone and keeping grass height below 10cm.

The Department of Fire and Emergency Services recently released the first Firewise Gardening in WA guide, which you can find on the DFES website.

The City has a Fire Hazard Inspection Officer, who can help you develop a plan to manage your fire risk. Visit our website to book an inspection.

After two successful trials, the Women's Aquatic Program will return to Swan Active Beechboro in October on a permanent basis.

Sessions will run from 5.30-7.30pm on Sundays in Terms 1 and 4, giving women of all cultural backgrounds an opportunity to build their swimming skills, fitness and social network.

Feedback from the two trials has been overwhelmingly positive.

The program – run in partnership with Royal Life Saving WA - has helped women overcome their fears, enjoy the water with their children and make new friends.
